October may be known for Fall Festivals, Pumpkin Spice, and candy, but did you know that there are also wonderful traditions and history found in the church during this important month? For starters, there are ties between Halloween celebrations and our All Saints day (feel free to ask me more about this, I am a bit of a history nerd.) Maybe lesser known, especially for Protestants, is that the beginning of the month celebrates the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi. Protestants don't often celebrate feast days of saints unless it involves heart shaped candy or leprechauns (St. Valentines & St. Patrick's), but I would argue this day is one worth recognizing.

St. Francis was the son of a wealthy cloth merchant born at the turn of the 13th century. He became disillusioned with his life of wealth and privilege, literally stripping off his wealthy clothes and taking a simple cloak from the bishop to live a life of poverty. Francis is known for many things including his care for the poor and sick, however this month he is particularly celebrated as the patron saint of animals. This is because Francis saw every animal as a beloved creature of God and was known to even preach to the birds.

I have a particular affinity for St. Francis. Both of our kids' nursery had a woodland theme, including pictures and statues of St. Francis himself, always depicted with animals at his feet and on his shoulders. It is probably no wonder where my kids get there love for nature from.

On October 6th at 2 PM, in the spirit of St. Francis, we will have a blessing of the animals on the front lawn of the church. This is an opportunity for us to not only acknowledge and recognize our pets as loved creatures of God, but to actually participate in Worship with them. I invite you to bring you pet, and invite your neighbors and friends to do the same as we celebrate the work of God's creation.



A stirring hymn that has spirited us constantly into action over the years has been **STAND UP**, **STAND UP FOR JESUS**. The following is a true story of its origin.

A great city-wide revival swept across Philadelphia in 1858, called "the work of God in Philadelphia". A powerful minister that participated was 29-year old Episcopalian, Dudley Tyng, who was known for his bold and uncompromising style.

In addition to pastoring his own church, Dudley began holding noonday services at the downtown YMCA. Great

crowds came to hear his dynamic messages. On March 30, 1858, over 5,000 men gathered for a noon service to hear Rev. Tyng preach from the text "ye that are men, go and serve the Lord". Over 1,000 committed their lives to Christ. At one point, the preacher exclaimed; "I must tell my Master's errand, and I would rather that this right arm were amputated at the trunk than that I should come short of my duty to you in delivering God's message".

In a chilling fulfillment of Tyng's commitment, the very next week he visited the country and watched the operation of a corn threshing machine in a barn. Tyng accidentally caught his loose sleeve between the cogs; his arm was lacerated severely with the main artery severed and the median nerve injured. As a result of the shock and a great loss of blood, the Rev. Dudley Tyng died.

On his death bed, when asked by a group of sorrowing friends and ministers for a final statement, he feebly whispered, "let us all stand up for Jesus". The next Sunday, Tyng's close friend and fellow pastor, Rev. George Duffield, preached his morning sermon as a tribute to his friend. He closed the sermon by reading a poem that he had just finished writing, inspired by the dying words of his esteemed friend:

Stand up, stand up for Jesus, ye soldiers of the Cross; lift high His royal banner - it must not suffer loss. From vict'ry until vict'ry, his Army shall He lead 'til every foe is vanquished and Christ is Lord indeed!

And another powerful hymn was born which still moves us to action to this day.

The Trustee Board has recently been made aware of more frequent incidences of water being left running in the kitchen bathroom sink. No reasonable explanation has been found for this issue.

Therefore, the Trustees have approved the locking of the kitchen bathroom door to protect and control water/sewer costs and prevent water damage should

flooding occur.

Utilization of the kitchen bathroom will be determined by the type and size of the activities occurring in the fellowship hall and access will be available if the activity warrants bathroom use.

Additionally, there have been more frequent incidences of church doors being left unlocked and unsecured for periods of time which may include overnight. This concern is currently being evaluated to find a workable solution. We ask the cooperation of everyone using the church building to insure that all church doors are locked and secured when leaving the building.

The Trustees appreciate the many multiple activities and events, whether they be church ministries or community related which take place at our church. The care and security of church property is of utmost importance and the responsibility of the trustee board. We ask the assistance of everyone to insure our church property is protected and secure.

Pastors Appreciate Your Prayers

October is Pastor Appreciation Month, an observance that some clergy don't publicize. It's an ideal time to thank pastors for their dedication to God's people and the ministry. A written note, a card or even a free meal is a nice gesture of appreciation. But if you were to ask pastors what they'd like or what they need, most would probably reply, "Pray for me."

That's what the apostle Paul requested throughout his letters. To the church at Rome, he urged, "Join me in earnest prayer to God on my behalf, that I may be rescued from the unbelievers in Judea and that my ministry to Jerusalem may be acceptable to the saints, so that by God's will I may come to you with joy and be refreshed in your company" (Romans 15:30-32, NRSV).

As you appreciate and encourage your pastors, remember them in your prayers. Then let them know you're doing so!
